Minimum Required Safety Equipment





**Unpowered Pleasure Craft
(not over 6M in length)**

(see separate posters for sailboards; paddleboats and watercycles; canoes, kayaks, rowboats and rowing shells)



Minimum Required Safety Equipment-Unpowered Pleasure Craft(not over 6M in length)

	<p>Personal protection equipment</p> <p>1. one Canadian-approved personal flotation device or lifejacket of appropriate size for each person on board</p>
	<p>2. one buoyant heaving line of not less than 15 m in length</p>
	<p>Boat safety equipment</p> <p>3. one manual propelling device</p> <p>OR</p> <p>an anchor with not less than 15 m of cable, rope or chain in any combination</p>

	<p>4. one Class 5BC fire extinguisher, if the pleasure craft is equipped with an inboard engine, a fixed fuel tank of any size, or a fuelburning cooking, heating or refrigerating appliance</p>
	<p>5. one bailer or one manual water pump fitted with or accompanied by sufficient hose to enable a person using the pump to pump water from the bilge of the vessel over the side of the vessel</p> <p>A bailer or manual water pump is not required for any self-bailing sealed hull sailing vessel fitted with a recess-type cockpit that cannot contain a sufficient quantity of water to make the vessel capsize or a multi-hull vessel that has subdivided multiple-sealed hull construction.</p>
	<p>Navigation equipment</p> <p>6. a sound-signalling device or a sound-signalling appliance</p>
	<p>7. navigation lights that meet the applicable standards set out in the Collision Regulations if the pleasure craft is operated after sunset and before sunrise or in periods of restricted visibility</p>

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
